



# Protect your Business



- ❖ **LIGHTS**-Keep the interior of your business well lit during non business hours. Make sure there is adequate lighting in the front and rear of your business and around all doors and windows.
- ❖ **REGISTERS**-Leave your register drawers *open* without anything in them. Place signs around your business that there is no cash on the premise.
- ❖ **ALARM SYSTEM**-Have a current alarm system and make sure to set the alarm every night.
- ❖ **SAFES**-Bolt safes to the floor and keep the area of the safe well lit.
- ❖ **CONTACT**-Leave an emergency contact number for officers that arrive on scene during non business hours. Leave the area undisturbed until police have completed their investigation.
- ❖ **CAMERAS**-Make sure cameras are of high quality and functioning properly. Place cameras where they will capture any incidents, including people and vehicles used. Immediate access to the video is essential to police investigations, make sure you and/or your employees can retrieve the video immediately.
- ❖ **CLEAR**-Keep all areas of possible entry and exit clean and clear of shrubs, pallets, debris and any camera obstructions.
- ❖ **SECURITY**-Check all locks and doors for any weaknesses. Use burglary resistant glass when available. Make sure any roof top access is secured.
- ❖ **LISTS**-Have a list available of serial numbers and any other identifying numbers that can be used to retrieve your property.

## Tips for Patrons



- ❖ Do not leave your purse unattended or on the back of your chair. If possible, do not carry a purse.
- ❖ If you carry a purse, make sure it is a zipped *and* buckled purse. Always have your purse in front of you or under your thigh.
- ❖ Carry your wallet in your front pocket.
- ❖ Carry a credit card instead of a debit card if possible.
- ❖ Bring with you only what you can afford to lose.
- ❖ Do not leave your phone on the table, especially when at an outdoor restaurant.
- ❖ Be alert of your surroundings and aware of anyone that causes a distraction.
- ❖ Immediately contact credit bureaus and banks when any of your cards have become compromised.

- A burglary occurs about every 14 seconds in the U.S.
- 65% of burglaries occur between 6am and 6pm
- About 30% of all burglaries are through unlocked windows and doors
- Homes without security systems are up to 300% more likely to be broken into
- A typical burglary last from 90 seconds to 12 minutes
- The master bedroom is usually the first room targeted.

Home Security Hints

Make sure all doors to the outside have good locks –deadbolt locks with a minimum of 1-1/2 inch bolt. Make sure locks are also installed on screen and storm doors, garage doors, patio doors and any other door that leads to the outside (including second-floor patios or decks).

Always use the locks on both your home and your garage. Lock up every time you go out, even if it's only for a few minutes. Almost 30 percent of burglars enter homes through unlocked doors or windows.

Make sure all entrances are well lit, with at least a 40 watt or equivalent LED bulb. Motion sensors are a great deterrent. A well-lit house is far better protected than a house without lights.

Overgrown bushes, tree limbs or landscaping can provide cover for burglars. Trim them to the height of porches or windows.

Wait to discard boxes of recently purchased high priced items such as TVs, computers, speakers or stereo equipment until the morning of the garbage pickup day.

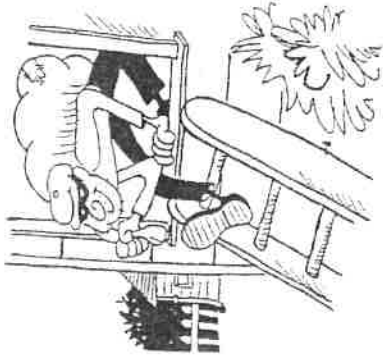
While you are on vacation, have a trusted neighbor (s) pick up your mail, newspapers, delivery boxes. Have the neighbor use your garbage cans occasionally. During winter, arrange to have the snow shoveled.

Dial 911 to report suspicious activity.

\*Take these simple steps to secure your home and increase the chances of not becoming a victim. While these steps may help you lessen the chance of becoming a burglary victim, they are NOT a guarantee.

### HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

The holiday season should be a time of great joy as we celebrate and share gifts with those close to us. Unfortunately, it can be a time when crime becomes more prevalent. These tips are offered to help make your holiday season a safe and happy one. Please take some time to read them and share them with your family and friends.

†**Be alert:** Walk confidently, with your head up, and stay in well-lighted and well-traveled areas. Pay attention to people walking in front of and behind you. Pay particular attention when you are in crowded areas, such as buses and trains or malls and stores that are filled with other shoppers. Places with large crowds are favorites for thieves and pickpockets.

If you carry a purse, keep it in front of you and close to your body. You can do this by covering the flap or clasp with your hand or forearm. Never leave your purse in a shopping cart or on a counter while you pay for your purchases. Remember not to carry open-weave bags or purses without zippers or flaps. Those items are easy marks for pickpockets. If you carry a change purse or wallet, keep it in your front pants pocket or in the inside breast pocket of your coat. Always be alert when opening your purse or wallet.

Try to shop with friends or relatives. Not only is there safety in numbers, but shopping in a group will give you a chance to catch up on things and renew friendships.

†**Be discreet:** Never carry large amounts of money. Whenever possible, use debit or credit cards or checks instead of cash. When using debit or credit cards, make sure that only one slip is printed with your card. Also, be sure to tear up any carbons that may be used to complete the transaction. Credit card fraud can ruin your holiday season.

Also, thieves and pickpockets are more likely to be attracted by expensive clothes and jewelry. When you are out doing your holiday shopping, dress comfortably and casually.

†**Secure your car:** Cars can be an easy target for criminals. Park your car as close to your destination as possible and in a well-lighted area. When you do your shopping remember to store your packages in the trunk of the car and not on the back seat. Also, if you take packages to the car but plan to return to the store or mall, drive your car to a new location within the parking lot. Criminals can be on the lookout for unsuspecting shoppers who simply drop their purchases into the trunk and then return to keep shopping.

†**Secure your home:** When you are out shopping, leave some lights on at home. You may also want to let a neighbor know that you will be out of the house for a short time, so they can watch your house for you. If you plan to be away for a longer period to visit friends or family over the holidays, make sure to tell a neighbor or friend who can keep an eye on your house. Have them check periodically to make sure packages that may have been delivered while you were gone aren't sitting on your porch.

### SUGERENCIAS PARA LA SEGURIDAD EN LAS VACACIONES NAVIDEÑAS

Las vacaciones navideñas deberían ser fiestas de gran gozo. Celebramos y compartimos regalos con las personas más cercanas y queridas. Desafortunadamente, este tiempo puede convertirse en un tiempo de crimen. Ofrecemos estas "Sugerencias para la Seguridad en sus vacaciones" para ayudarles a las pasen seguras y saludables. Por favor, hagan tiempo para leerlas y compartirlas con sus familiares y amistades.

**√Estén alertos:** Caminen con confianza, la cabeza alzada, y manténganse en áreas bien iluminadas y populosas. Presten atención a las personas que caminan delante o detrás de ustedes. Presten particular atención cuando se encuentran en áreas donde hay mucha gente, por ejemplo en los autobuses y trenes urbanos, en los centros comerciales y en las tiendas que están llenas de clientes. Estos lugares donde hay muchas personas son los más favoritos de los ladrones y rateros.

Si llevan bolso, manténgalo delante de ustedes y pegado a su cuerpo. Se puede hacer esto cerrándolo bien o apretándolo con la mano o con la muñeca. Nunca dejen el bolso en el carrito de compras o sobre el mostrador mientras pagan por la compra. Recuerden que no deben llevar bolsas de tejido abiertas o bolsos sin cierres o sin cubierta cerrada. Estas cosas son marcas fáciles para los rateros. Si llevan bolsa de cambio o cartera, guárdenla en el bolsillo del pantalón en el bolsillo interior de su abrigo o saco. Estén siempre muy alertos al abrir su bolso o cartera.

Procuran ir de compras con familiares o amistades. Ir con varias personas no solamente ayuda a la seguridad, sino que les dará oportunidad de ponerse al día en lo que pasa y renovar amistades.

**√Sean discretos:** Nunca lleven mucho dinero. Siempre que puedan usen tarjetas de crédito o cheques. Al usar las tarjetas de crédito asegúrense de que la compra se escriba en solamente una hoja de pago. Asimismo, rompan el papel carbón usado en el talón de la compra.

El fraude cometido con sus tarjetas de crédito fácilmente echa a perder sus vacaciones. Generalmente los ladrones y rateros se sienten más atraídos por la ropa cara y las joyas. Cuando vayan de compras para las festividades de la época vístanse cómodos y casualmente.

**√Aseguren su automóvil:** Los coches pueden ser fáciles marcas para los criminales. Estacionen sus coches lo más cerca posible del lugar a donde van y en lugar bien iluminado. Guarden sus compras en la cajuela del automóvil. Nunca la dejen en los asientos del coche. También si llevan compras al coche y quieren regresar a la tienda, estacionen el coche en un lugar diferente del estacionamiento. A veces los criminales espían a las personas que van de compras y las dejan en la cajuela del coche y regresan al comercio a comprar otras cosas.

**√Aseguren su hogar:** Cuando vayan de compras dejen alguna luz encendida en casa. También podrían anunciar a algún vecino de confianza que van a salir un rato, para que ellos le echen un vistazo de vez en cuando a su casa. Si planean alejarse del hogar por bastante tiempo para visitar a familiares o amistades durante las vacaciones, asegúrense de que algún vecino o amistad puede vigilar su hogar. Pídanles que vigilen periódicamente si algún paquete o envío ha sido depositado en su porche y que por favor se los guarden hasta su regreso.
